## Peace to You

What a strange month March 2020 has been. Our normal daily routines had ground to a halt, due to the threat of the novel coronavirus. Lenten-like practices of self-discipline have been required of us, not for our own spiritual health, but for everyone's physical health. And we have, for the most part, willingly complied. But unlike lent, there is no set end date for rejoicing in the resurrection life. And we who are Christians are going to celebrate Resurrection Day quite differently this year – alone – or with immediate family.

Personally, I cannot remember the last time I didn't attend church on Easter – at least since I quit dairy farming in 1986. And the last fifteen years I have played major roles in conducting, not only Easter services, but three to four public services during Holy Week. It is usually the busiest time of the year for me, pushing my limits. This year is very different. First of all, I have more time just before Easter than in a normal week. Even though I am writing this article, a thing I normally do at this time, and will soon be preparing and delivering the regular Holy Week sermons online, it will be less my seniors home services and weekly bible study. And I won't be commuting, thus creating for myself ten to fifteen hours a week right there. Some of the hours are lost in inefficiency (mainly because I have to share my home, home office, and internet hotspot with three overly energetic teenagers) but there are still many more. Fortunately for me, I can go outside with no limit – however without my office tools.

Our farm, which has been such a burden for me in past years has suddenly been a great help for me this year. Those ten to fifteen hours that I usually use to commute, taking its toll on my energy levels, are now taken up with energizing walks, gardening, and cleaning up forest debris, feeling the closeness of God in nature, with the healthy side effect of giving me peace in troubling times. There is more time with God, and more time with family, and that is a

great benefit. Right after the restrictions, due to the coronavirus, were put in place, my blood pressure began to rise. Whereas commuting may have worsened it, these activities and sight of new growth in nature have helped it go down, so there are good benefits of the measures for me personally, besides "lowering the curve". And there are many good things that many of us can also take advantage of with more time at home. More meals together with family, communing with one another. More devotion times, alone, and with our families. More time connecting with friends and family over phone and other social media. More time to pray.

all that bad. Today I was blessed watching two mallard ducks swimming in the canal outside our window. The birds are singing, frogs are peeping, and the trees are beginning to bud. The fiddleheads will soon be up – followed shortly by asparagus in the garden. And best of all, Christ is still risen and reigning.





(Lk 24:18,19) "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! <sup>26</sup> Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" (Lk 24:25-26) "Peace to you!" (Lk 24:36) "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? <sup>39</sup> See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me, and see" (Lk 24:38-39).

Disciple Life 2020 was co-sponsored by the NALC, the North American Lutheran Church, and our Province, the Anglican Church in North America.

The NALC was formed in 2010, for reasons similar to the ACNA. Bob and I got to know one of the Lutheran delegates. She shared her feelings of hurt and betrayal, which many of us experienced as members of our former Diocese.

But the Lord is good, and like Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt, He led us into what would become the Anglican Network in Canada and the Anglican Church in North America.

As Bob and I expected, this conference was demanding. In different ways, all the speakers challenged us to be disciples in our own lives and in our churches. The break-out session led by ACNA Bishop Clark Lowenfield struck me particularly. The title of his talk was "Is Your Congregation Ready For Making Disciples?" He told us we were not, otherwise we would not be attending the conference.

He said that his congregation is "more Republican than Christian"—that our own churches have rocky soil—ouch! Making disciples is hard work—one person at a time, one family at a time. Making disciples is sacrificial—prayer, fasting, and the gift of TIME is part of the equation.

Bishop Charlie gathered the ANiC delegates together for supper on the last full day of the conference. I had a chance to speak with Matt+ and Grace from Lennoxville, and Pete+ Ann and Simeon Molloy from Ontario. Fourteen delegates from ANiC—more than any ACNA diocese—attended the conference. Recordings of the Disciple Life 2020 sessions may be listened to online. I intend to continue to review my notes and will listen again to the talks.

And trust Me with the deep movements


Of your heart.

#### The Burial of Jesus

Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the Council, went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether Jesus was already dead. When he learned that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. He took down the body and Nicodemus, who had at first come to Jesus by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pounds'



weight. They took the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb belonging to Joseph where no one had ever been laid. The tomb was close at hand, and it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning, so they laid Jesus there and rolled a stone against the door of the tomb and departed.



Mary Magdalene and the other Mary, the mother of Joses were there, sitting opposite the sepulchre. They saw the tomb, and how his body was laid; then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments.

On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

#### The Guard of Soldiers

Next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate and said, "Sir, we remember how that imposter said, while he was still alive, 'After three days I will rise again.' Therefore order the sepulchre to be made secure until the third day, lest his disciples go and steal him away, and tell the people, 'He has risen from the dead,' and the last fraud will be worse than the first."



Pilate said to them, "You have a guard of soldiers; go, make it as secure as you can." So they went and made the sepulchre secure by sealing the stone and setting a guard.

When the women went in they did not find the body. #### The Report of the Guard



And when they had assembled with the elders and taken counsel, they gave a sum of money to the soldiers and said, "Tell people, 'His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep.' And if this comes to the governor's ears, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." So they took the money and did as they were directed; and this story has been spread among the Jews to this day.


#### SCIENCE AND THE BIBLE

A conversation with a non-Christian friend inspired me to do some research. He said that he was surprised that 'educated' people like Helen and myself believed in the Bible. He meant it in a nice way. Up till now, he said he had only been exposed to 'uneducated' Christians who could not intellectually explain their belief. Of course, he did not become a Christian immediately after our conversation, but he said that he was intrigued. My friend's opinion is actually quite prevalent amongst non-Christians. Are they correct? That was what my research was about (mainly from Wikipedia and Creation.com) – Albert Einstein (1879-1955) who most people call a 'genius' did not believe in a personal God but he admired and based his work on that of his heroes of science: Isaac Newton, Michael Faraday and James Clerk Maxwell. Who were they?








Newton Faraday Maxwell (Photographs of Maxwell, Faraday and Newton taken from Wikipedia)

ISAAC NEWTON (1642-1727) who lived in Cambridge, UK, was an English mathematician, astronomer, physicist, theologian and author. He is widely recognized as one of the most influential scientists of all time and a key figure in the scientific revolution. His book *Mathematical Principles of Natural Philosophy* laid the foundations of mechanics. Newton also made pathbreaking contributions to optics, and he shares credit for developing calculus. Newton's laws of motion and gravitation dominated scientists' view of the physical universe for the next three centuries. Newton also built the first practical reflecting telescope and developed a sophisticated theory of colour based on the observation that a prism decomposes white light into the colours of the visible spectrum. Newton was a Bible-believing Christian although he also dabbled in alchemy. He wrote more on theology than on science, believing the Bible to be God's Word.

MICHAEL FARADAY (1791-1867) who lived in London was an English scientist. Although Faraday had little formal education, he was one of the most influential scientists in history. His inventions of electromagnetic rotary devices formed the foundation of electric motor technology, and it was largely due to his efforts that electricity became practical for use. As a chemist, Faraday discovered benzene and he was also the first person to liquify Chlorine and ammonia. Faraday was an excellent experimentalist who conveyed his ideas in clear and simple language. James Clerk Maxwell summarized the work of Faraday and others and put it in a set of equations which is accepted as the basis of all modern theories of electromagnetic phenomena. Faraday was a member of a very conservative offshoot of the Church of Scotland known for their plain interpretation of the Bible - "a strong sense of the unity of God and nature pervaded Faraday's life and work." On his death bed he was asked, "What are your speculations now?" He answered: I have no speculations. I rest upon Jesus Christ who died, and rose again from death."

JAMES CLERK MAXWELL (1831-1879) who lived in Edinburgh was a Scottish scientist. He formulated the the-

ory of electromagnetic radiation, bringing together for the first time, electricity, magnetism, and light as manifestations of the same phenomenon. Without his theory, we would not have many of the things we rely on today – light bulbs, radios, TVs, motors, generators, microwaves, x-rays, computers, etc. Maxwell was a Bible-believing Christian and was widely read in theology. He saw man's ever-changing understanding of how the world works as the problem, not God's unchanging Word.
